occupying one block of the Bloemfontein Hostel. As a result of the lack of hostel facilities, many female students are being forced to stay in boarding houses close to the faculty and are facing many financial and social difficulties. CoMSAA has taken the initiative to launch a Girl's Hostel Project with the aim of acquiring a suitable property in close proximity to the faculty to establish a new girls' hostel. CoMSAA Awards

Sumi Moonasinghe Award 2018

Walter Patrick Award for Excellence in Community Medicine



The Walter Patrick award is an annual award of Rs20,000 to the best performer at the first examination of Community Sciences Stream. Jayanthi Kuru-Utumpala is the first Sri Lankan, and first Sri Lankan woman to summit Mount Everest (8,848m/29,030ft), a double record she achieved at 5:03am on 21st May 2016. She is a mountaineering professional and women's rights advocate. Her passion for adventure is balanced with her passion for gender equality. Since 2003, she has been professionally involved with the sport of rock climbing as an instructor, while simultaneously working full-time



as a women's rights advocate. Jayanthi is currently serving as the first ever Goodwill Ambassador for Women's Rights for the Ministry of Women's Affairs.

Jayanthi Kuru-Utumpala graciously accepted CoMSAAs' invitation to be a guest speaker on the 29th of March 2019. Her presentation took the audience through a journey to the top of the world and back, focusing on key life-changing experiences that she had encountered during her challenging and unforgettable journey to the





summit of Mount Everest. Her presentation focused on the importance of dreaming big and the equal importance of nurturing a dream. It also focused on the effectiveness of planning, preparation, and teamwork required to achieve one's goal. The presentation highlighted the importance of changing and adapting to new environments and the critical role that a positive mind can play. It focused on how and why one needs to believe in oneself in order to achieve one's goals,



because, being passionate about what one does is critical to what can be achieved in whatever one undertakes. The presentation concluded by drawing out the gendered implications of this journey and how critical it is to challenge gender stereotypes and eliminate discrimination based on gender so that future generations of women and girls, men and boys, can enjoy the benefits of mutual respect and equality.

From the Editors

How Authentic are You?

Authenticity is a highly valued quality. We prefer not to associate people who are false. It makes us feel disconnected from them, at best, and manipulated, at worst. On the other hand, we do like people who are genuine and authentic. Our relationships with them feel secure.

We tend to think that an authentic person is one who speaks and acts in a way that is aligned with his/her beliefs, despite taking a stand contrary to popular opinion at times. However, authenticity is much more than being aligned in speech, behaviour and thought.

The core of authenticity is the character of the person. In many schools of psychology, authenticity is considered the pinnacle of psychological maturity and the cornerstone of psychological well-being. Departures from authenticity are seen as increases in psychology. Authentic people possess a number of qualities that indicate they are psychologically well-functioning (Joseph, 2016):

- 1. Have a realistic view of reality
- 2. Are accepting of themselves and of other people
- 3. Have a non-hostile sense of humour
- 4. Are able to express their emotions freely and clearly
- 5. Are open to learning from their mistakes
- 6. Understand their motivations

If behind what a person says and does is a defensive and self-deceptive approach to life, then no matter how passionate and committed they are to a cause, ultimately they are not being true to themselves, and as result are not psychologically well-functioning.

Authenticity

Know Own Be yourself yours

Happiness is when what you think, what you say and what you do are in harmony

How authentic are you? Take the Authenticity Scale (Wood et al. 2008):

Rate yourself in a scale of 1 (does not describe me at all) to 7 (describes me very well).

- 1. I think it is better to be yourself, than to be popular
- 2. I don't know how I really feel inside
- 3. I am strongly influenced by the opinions of others
- 4. I usually do what other people tell me to do
- 5. I always feel I need to do what others expect me to do
- 6. Other people influence me greatly
- 7. I feel as if I don't know myself very well
- 8. I always stand by what I believe in
- 9. I am true to myself in most situations
- 10. I feel out of touch with the real me
- 11. I live in accordance with my values and belief
- 12. I feel alienated from myself

How to score?

The Authenticity scale comprises three subscales of:

- 1. Authentic Living the extent to which one behaves in a way consistent with one's conscious awareness of physiological states, emotions, beliefs and cognition
- 2. Self-alienation the extent to which there is a disparity between conscious awareness and actual experience
- 3. Accepting External Influence the extent to which one accepts the influence of others and the belief that one has to conform to them

Total items 1,8,9 and 11 for Authentic Living, items 2, 7, 10 and 12 for Self-alienation, 3, 4, 5 and 6 for Accepting External Influences.

Higher the score in Authentic Living, the more one is authentic. Lower the score in Selfalienation and Accepting External Influence, the more one is authentic.

News from our Students: Medical Undergraduates Coming to the fore in Research

The previous issue of the CoMSAA newsletter highlighted the establishment of the University of Colombo Clinical Society, which was a novel approach by the Colombo medical undergraduates to widen their horizons and enhance their skills. Continuing in that same momentum, two undergraduate projects gained recognition in scientific forums and competitions held during the past few months.

1."Nephrosnap" - a mobile app for detecting levels of proteinuria

Prasan Warnakula and Prabuddhi Fernandopulle, two fourth year students of the Colombo medical faculty along with Vipulananda Pragatheeshwaran, a student of the University of Moratuwa developed a simple yet innovative tool to detect urine protein levels through a photograph taken by a mobile phone. This innovative app termed "Nephrosnap" won the championship at Brainstorm, the Premiere Biomedical Competition in Sri Lanka. This was the only submission by a medical school, and it was a proud moment for Prof Jennifer Perera, the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine Colombo who witnessed this competition.

This app was developed by Prasan and Prabuddhi during their electives program which was supervised by Prof Saroj Jayasinghe, Chair Professor of Medicine and Dr Nuwan

Dayananda of the University of Moratuwa. In conditions like nephrotic syndrome, where daily monitoring of urine protein is required, Nephrosnap has the potential for providing a more accurate and earlier detection of relapse. The app uses an image of the heated urine to generate an objective grading of the level of proteinuria.

The Brainstorm competition, which was organized by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) Engineering in Medicine and Biology Society (EMBS) Student Branch





Chapter at University of Moratuwa, was held at IESL Auditorium on 05th October 2018 with the presentation of around 30 new innovative products representing universities and other private institutions around the island. The young inventors are now keen to try out this new tool among patients and are seeking support to develop this project further into a marketable and productive venture.

2. Nomophobia - the latest ailment among medical students!

'No mobile phobia', nomophobia for short, is an irrational fear of losing access to one's smart phone. In a study among 150 medical students from the Colombo medical faculty it was found that all the students had at least mild forms nomophobia, while 1 in 10 showed signs of severe nomophobia. These were the findings of Jithmal Meegoda, Amanda Matharage and Yasas Mapa; three third-year medical students who along with their supervisor Dr N Gunathilaka, conducted this study as part of their Community Medicine Research project.

Going beyond the undergraduate scope of this project, these students presented their findings at the Annual Research Symposium of the Faculty of Medicine Colombo held in November 2018, under the title "Prevalence of nomophobia and its effect on psychological well-being in smartphone using undergraduates of a selected medical faculty in Sri Lanka". Their efforts were duly rewarded by winning the third place in the Free Paper category.

Since then the students have already presented this study at several other local and international conferences including the Asia Pacific Medical Educational Conference (APMEC) organized by the National University of Singapore in January 2019 and the International Medical Undergraduate Research Symposium (IMURC) organized by the Faculty of Medicine, University of Sri Jayewardenepura where they won first place under the mental health category. CoMSAA is proud to have partially supported them during their overseas travel.

Jithmal and his team are keen on expanding their study further and would also like to increase awareness regarding this growing health concern especially among the younger generations.
